



Admission Fee

Celebrating 50 years!

The first "Sheep and Wool Crafts Festival" was held in 1974 at the Carroll County Fairgrounds in Westminster, Maryland. Prior to the establishment of the Festival, the only place that handspinners could buy fleeces was at the Maryland Sheep Breeders Association's annual wool pool, where this buying and selling tended to disrupt the regular business and was also not precisely legal; since technically the buying company had contracted to buy all the wool brought into the Pool.

This first Festival was a one-day event and included a highly successful wool sale (it was reported that "mobs of hand spinners" from six different states snapped up the fleeces); demonstrations of spinning and weaving; wool craft sales; a Lamb & Wool Queen Contest; a food booth selling lamb barbecue; a freezer lamb raffle; live sheep exhibits; shearing demonstrations; working sheepdog demonstrations; a ladies' lead contest; and a decorated lamb class. Attendance was estimated to be around 1500 people.

Over the years, more events were added; sheep shows debuted in 1979. By 1980, the Festival had outgrown the Carroll County Fairgrounds and was moved to its present location at the Howard County Fairgrounds. There were a whopping 25 craft booths at that time! Now there are close to 275 vendor booths, attendance has increased more than tenfold, and the Festival is widely viewed as one of the premier festivals of its kind in the nation.

The first Festival chairman was Janet Sorrells. She was followed by Rae Nicholson, Charlotte Gardner, and Mary Streaker. Our current chairman, Gwen Handler, has held the position since 1994. Kudos to all for leading us to where we are today!

Special Features

The Return of Njörðr's Wanderers

After being rained out on Saturday last year, Njörðr's Wanderers will be making a return engagement this year. We portray a typical seasonal trading camp found along waterways between Ireland, Iceland, France, and Denmark, between the years 800-1000. We focus on the people, activities, and goods found within these camps, in a living history format using appropriate roles, clothing,



techniques, and equipment. We set up our camp with merchant's booths, tents, and workshops, where one would meet crafters and traders in textiles, fur and ivory, foodstuffs and fisherfolk, town guards, religious figures and nobility, and transients and travelers.

For the 2023 Maryland Sheep and Wool Festival, Njörðr's Wanderers will explore how wool was instrumental in fueling exploration and trade. We will show wool, textile, and garment production by costumed crafters, with recreated examples of tools and technology used in the various stages of wool production, including the loom, comb, and spindle. Importantly, we will also discuss the power and relationships between women, magic, mythology, and wool, and how women drove the early Medieval economy. As the demonstrations are continuous and informal, the visitor may enter the camp at any time and interact with the crafters in an organic, living history environment.

We participate in several events throughout the year, including Military Through the Ages at Jamestown Settlement (Mar), Frederick Fiber Festival (Apr), Carroll County Celtic Festival (June), Maryland Irish Festival (Nov), and several events throughout the year at Fort Loudoun Historic Site, including the Across the Centuries historical timeline (May). Our members are in Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Virginia, and we welcome opportunities to collaborate with other living history groups, sites, and events.



Featured Breed: Jacob



The majestic Jacob Sheep is a special addition to flocks throughout North America. Unique, regal, useful, hardy – with their strikingly impressive horns and spotted fleece, there are few breeds that excite the interest of others as does the Jacob.

The American Jacob sheep is distinct from its British counterpart and has not undergone improved breeding to satisfy the commercial marketplace. American Jacobs have a smaller frame and more primitive body shape than the British Jacobs. Known in the distant past as "Piebald" or "Spanish" sheep, there are several historical narratives about Jacob sheep origins, including being direct descendants of the flock of sheep acquired by Jacob, as in the biblical account in Genesis, chapter 30, or that they were washed ashore from shipwrecks during the attempted invasion of the Spanish Armada during the reign of Elizabeth I. The name "Jacob" was possibly introduced in the mid-1800s. Jacobs probably originated in what is now Syria some three thousand years ago. Pictorial



evidence traces movements of this breed through North Africa, Sicily, Spain, and on to England where they graced large estates and country homes for many centuries. Jacob sheep were imported into the United States and Canada in the early 1900s for use in game parks and zoos. These early flocks were later bought by private individuals.

The Jacob is a small to medium size breed. Adult ewes range from 80-120 pounds, while rams range from 120 to 180 pounds. Ideally, coloration of this spotted breed should be 60% white with 40% random.

distinct, black or lilac (grayish) spots or patches over the body. The preferred facial coloration consists of a pair of colored eye patches and a white blaze extending to a colored muzzle. Legs can be spotted or white, while the hooves should be black or striped. The legs are free from wool, as is the portion of the head in front of the horns.

Jacob sheep are carriers of the polycerate gene, allowing them to produce two, four, or six horns, with both rams and ewes having horns. The most spectacular representatives of the breed are rams with four well-balanced horns often reaching 30 inches or more. Jacob fleeces are a delight for handspinners and connoisseurs of natural color. They are light and open, weighing between three

and six pounds with a staple length of three to seven inches. Fleeces part easily, exposing a soft, medium grade wool. Due to the spotting, the wool can be spun into a complete spectrum from white through gray lilac to black. They are easily handled and show a good resistance to parasites and foot problems. Ewes lamb easily, usually with twins, and the lambs are up and nursing quickly. Carcasses are lean



and flavorful with a minimum of waste from slaughter to table. The Jacob is ideal for both the small flock owner and the larger breeder.

The Jacob Sheep Breeders Association



The Jacob Sheep Breeders Association (JSBA) was formed in 1988 through the encouragement and guidance of the American Minor Breeds Conservancy (now The Livestock Conservancy) and is of prime importance in maintaining this majestic and ancient breed in its present form, as it is considered "threatened" on The Livestock Conservancy's list. The purpose of JSBA is to ensure the conservation of this

heritage breed through inspection, registration, and education. Our community of members have Jacob flocks throughout the U.S. and Canada. For additional information, visit our website at: www.jsba.org.

- No soliciting.
- No distribution of any printed material/flyers/advertisements, etc.
- No personal announcements. Please arrange a meeting place before your group separates.
- Not responsible for lost articles.
- There will be a \$25 charge on any check returned for any reason.
- The Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival reserves the right to exclude from the fairgrounds any person (exhibitor, spectator, vendor, admission paying patron) who is in any manner disruptive or who exhibits inappropriate behavior that would disturb the public. Such behavior may include, but not be limited to, any public cursing, abusive, or belligerent language, or any language or conduct which causes others to feel threatened. The Festival may delegate authority to impose any such sanction to its designated security officers. Said sanction shall also include the right to temporarily or permanently ban participation in future events. In the event a person who has paid admission to the fairgrounds is asked to leave the premises, such admission shall be refunded when the person leaves the premises.

Animal Health Regulations

All exhibitors and vendors bringing livestock to the Festival Please see Maryland Animal Health Fair and Show Requirements at https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx.

- All Maryland livestock must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued by an accredited veterinarian within ninety (90) days of the opening date of the Festival.
- All out-of-state livestock must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian within thirty (30) days of the opening date of the Festival.
- In addition to the appropriate CVI, a Livestock Exhibitors Self Certification of Animal Health is required for all sheep and goats brought onto the fairgrounds.
- All sheep and goats must be officially scrapie-identified via USDAapproved eartag, legible tattoo, or a microchip ID (if the owner provides the reader).

ANIMALS FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR BE REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS IMMEDIATELY.

- Due to Maryland Veterinary Inspection standards, no animals can be kept/penned outside of Festival buildings.
- Un-weaned baby lambs or those less than 60 days of age are not allowed at the Festival. This is very important due to health issues.

** Animals to be sold at the Festival**

If you sell your animals while at the Festival, please do not allow the purchaser to remove the animal from your pens until after release on Sunday. If this occurs, ineligibility for future Festival shows and/or forfeiture of premium money may occur. If you have an animal that you have pre-sold, please have the CVI completed by your veterinarian along with your show papers. All animals that are moved from Maryland and not returned to the state of origin MUST be accompanied by a Maryland CVI. The scrapie program has enabled animals to be tracked from farm to farm.

Applications will be accepted through April 15, 2023. The scholarship presentation will be made in the Show Ring at the Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival on Sunday, May 7, 2023 around 3:15 p.m. The winner will also be honored at the Maryland Sheep Breeders Annual Dinner in October.

Pre-Festival Shepherd Workshop

Integrated Parasite Management and FAMACHA© Certification Workshop with Susan Schoenian

Friday, May 5 from 10:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Show Ring
The FAMACHA© eye anemia system is a tool for making deworming decisions. In order to get a FAMACHA© card, you must attend an approved training. This workshop will certify participants in the use of the FAMACHA© system, as well as discuss other ways of controlling internal parasitism on small ruminant farms. The workshop will also include instruction on fecal egg counting. Be sure to bring a sample (kept cool) from your farm.

Class Fee: \$25 per farm or family (1 FAMACHA© card per registration). 25 student maximum. Pre-registration required at https://mswf2023. eventbrite.com.

Beyond Antibiotics: Minimizing Drug Use in Small Ruminants with Susan Schoenian

Saturday, May 7 from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. in the Dining Hall Beginning June 11, 2023, you will no longer be able to purchase antibiotics, such as penicillin and LA-200 over-the-counter from your local farm store or online business. A veterinary prescription will be required. Several years ago, antibiotics put in the feed or water were put under veterinary supervision and the feeding of antibiotics to promote growth was banned. At the same time, resistance to anthelmintics (dewormers) continues to grow. Bottom line: we need to learn to raise sheep with less reliance on drugs and more reliance on management, nutrition, and genetics.

Susan Schoenian retired from the University of Maryland in 2022, after more than 37 years of work in agricultural extension work. For the past 21 years, she served as the Sheep & Goat Specialist for University of Maryland Extension. Susan continues her involvement in the sheep/goat industry, including management of extension programs and online resources for the American Consortium for Small Ruminant Parasite Control. Introduction to Animal Welfare for Sheep and Goats with Wendy Weirich, DVM

Saturday, May 7 from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in the Dining Hall Good welfare is important to the health and productivity of sheep and goats. This presentation will provide an introduction to the science of animal welfare including the Five Freedoms and the Five Domains. We will discuss some examples for sheep and goats. There will be a brief overview of some available certification programs and the benefits of promoting animal welfare for your business and yourself.

Dr. Wendy Weirich is an animal welfare consultant. In this role, she interprets the latest animal welfare science and develops practical applications that farmers can employ on their farms to ensure high welfare for their animals and help to meet the expectations of their customers. Wendy has also worked for 15 years as an independent auditor for several farm animal welfare certification programs.

Does Solar Make Sense for Your Farm? with Drew Schiavone

This presentation will cover important topics to help you decide if solar is right for you, and how you can install a solar electric system that will meet your needs. Topics will include how solar energy works and what role it plays, how a solar project impacts you as a landowner, and how to finance and facilitate a solar project.

Dr. Drew Schiavone is the Energy Conservation and Technology Specialist for University of Maryland Extension. He coordinates applied research and delivers educational programming, in the areas of energy conservation and clean energy technology. His current efforts are focused on the deployment of energy efficient technologies for rural businesses and farms, as well as energy policy related to on-farm renewable energy systems.

Is Solar Grazing Right for You? with Nick Armentrout

They enjoy the shade of the solar panels on hot days, napping and grazing where humans would struggle to reach. They are resourceful foragers, walking to search for vegetation that might otherwise become a shady nuisance for the solar company. This presentation will cover the ins and outs of solar grazing with sheep. What are the things you need to consider if you are interested in grazing solar sites with your sheep?

Nick Armentrout is project manager at Agrovoltaic Solutions Inc. and secretary of the American Solar Grazing Association. He has a professional background in small business and supply chain administration, sales, land and livestock management. Nick has spent most of his adult years somehow engaged with animal agriculture and organic farming. Initially ranching in Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho, he returned home to Maine to start Spring Creek Farm with his wife, Sarah, in 1998. Spring Creek Farm is a mixed-power, organic, horse, sheep, hay and small grain farm.

There is a major disconnect between what we wear and our knowledge of its impact on land, air, water, labor and human health. Even those who value access to safe, local and nutritious food have largely overlooked the production of fiber, dyes, and the chemistry that forms the backbone of modern textile production. While humans are 100 percent reliant on their second skin of clothing, it's common for us to think little about the biological and human cultural context from which our clothing derives.

Over a decade ago, weaver and natural dyer Rebecca Burgess developed a project focused on wearing clothing made from fiber grown, woven and sewn within her bioregion of North Central California. From that first project, a movement has grown seeking to support new regional textile economies with deep roots in climate change prevention and soil restoration. From its humble beginnings, the "fibershed" movement took hold and today, Fibershed is a non-profit organization that develops regional fiber systems that build ecosystems and community health. Their work expands opportunities to implement climate benefitting agriculture, rebuild regional manufacturing, and connect end-users to the source of our fiber through education. Fibershed is supported by over 58 regional affiliates worldwide.

Join us for a panel discussion from the organizers of the east coast Fibershed affiliates who will be discussing the work of our local fibersheds and sustainable fiber practices. Learn why developing regional fiber systems that build soil and protect the health of our biosphere is important to us all, what fibershed projects are happening in our region, and how you can participate in the sustainable fiber movement.

Sunday 12:00 p.m. Show Ring

The American sheep industry offers a wide range of genetic diversity. To celebrate that diversity and showcase the contributions of different breeds of sheep, the 2023 Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival will feature a Parade of Sheep Breeds that will include many rare and exotic breeds. As countries from around the world have contributed to the sheep industry in the United States, the breeds will be introduced by their country of origin. England, New Zealand, France, the Netherlands, Spain, Iceland, and Africa will be represented.

Sheep Breeds Display

Saturday and Sunday All Day Barn 7-8

A rare opportunity to view over thirty different breeds of sheep in one place. Breeders will explain in their presentations the characteristics of the breed, advantages and disadvantages of the breed, and other pertinent information. Awards are given on the basis of attractiveness of presentation in the categories of Dual-Purpose Sheep, Hair Breeds, Meat Sheep, Minor Breeds, and Wool Sheep.

Criteria for Sheep Breeds Display Evaluation:

Sheep - 10 points Sheep must be in the pen at the time of judging unless they are being shown in one of the sheep shows at the Festival. They should be good representatives of their breed and in proper fleece for the season. Meat breeds may be slick shorn.

Educational Value - 50 points Information about the breed of sheep should be included in the display. It should include origin of the breed, the breed's primary purpose, and other information of interest to the general public.

Handout Material - 10 points Handouts should be available.

General Appearance - 30 points The display should be attractive and relatively clean. Clean water must be available to the animals at all times. Bedding in the pen should also be clean.

New Breed-Specific Class: A new class for Valais Blacknose Sheep fleeces will join the ranks of our Breed-Specific classes. As with all of the breed-specific classes, the fleeces will be judged to the breed standard as well as suitability for handspinning.

Jacob Sheep Breeders Association Special Awards: Jacob Sheep will be the featured breed at the Festival this year and the Jacob Sheep Breeders Association is offering special awards for Champion (\$50) and Reserve Champion (\$35) Jacob Fleeces.

Fleece Entry Options: All fleeces must be for sale.

- **Show and Sale** (\$7 per fleece): Fleeces entered in competition to be judged and eligible for awards, and also consigned for sale (Divisions I, II and III).
- **Sale Only** (\$4 per fleece): Fleeces consigned for sale but not judged or eligible for awards (Divisions I and II only).
- Maryland Shepherds Cup: Award for the best set of 5 handspinning fleeces from an individual Maryland shepherd/flock. Each fleece must be individually entered for Show & Sale in the appropriate Division and Class. Only one entry of 5 fleeces per shepherd/flock. No additional entry fee.

Fleece Standards:

- 1. Producers are urged to be selective in choosing fleeces to enter.
- 2. Fleeces must be from the current (2022-2023) wool clip and represent no more than 15 months growth.
- 3. Maximum of 7 fleeces per exhibitor. The same fleece may not be entered in more than one class or division.
- 4. Whole fleeces only (no half or partial fleeces).
- 5. Each fleece must be skirted to ensure it is clean, dry, as free as possible of contaminants (e.g., vegetative matter (VM), chaff, burrs, manure tags and second cuts, etc.).
- 6. Minimum staple length of 2 inches. Note that 3 inches and above is preferred by most hand-spinners (as appropriate to breed type).
- 7. The Committee reserves the right to reject any fleeces not meeting standards (e.g., excessive dirt or VM; fleeces with active lice; excessively short fleeces; cotted, wet, or moldy fleeces, etc.). Entry fees will not be refunded for rejected fleeces.

Entry Requirements:

- 8. Fleeces must be in a clear, unmarked plastic bag that can be easily opened (no ties or knots).
- 9. Weights must be provided to the nearest quarter pound. The Committee reserves the right to re-weigh fleeces if entered weights are questionable.
- 10. Breed designation: Breed information on the entry forms should be designated in one of two ways:
 - For purebred single breed: Breed Name (e.g. Romney)
 - For crosses or mixes of more than one breed: Predominant Breed Name X (e.g., Romney X). Predominant Breed refers to the breed that is either the highest percentage breed in the cross OR the breed in the cross/mix whose qualities are most reflected in the individual fleece.

Additional details may be entered under the optional Fleece ID field and will print out on the tag that will be fastened to the bag.

- 11. Prices are set by the producers. Fleece prices will be rounded to the nearest \$.25 for all cash sales at the point of check-out in order to simplify Festival cash management. Producers are urged to be reasonable in the prices they set. A summary of the price ranges for different breeds and categories of fleeces entered last year is available on the Festival website and may provide useful guidance.
- 12. Entry forms must be **RECEIVED** no later than Thursday, April 27, 2023 accompanied by entry fee.
- 13. Entry fees are: \$4 per fleece consigned for Sale Only, and \$7 per fleece consigned for Show & Sale.
- 14. Producers are responsible for entering their fleeces in the appropriate division and class. Judges may not re-classify fleeces once they are delivered.

Show and Sale Rules and Responsibilities:

15. Producers entering fleeces are responsible for picking up ribbons in the Fleece

Show & Sale office anytime after 11:00 a.m. on Saturday. Premiums will be mailed to winners with their fleece sales checks.

 Producers are responsible for picking up unsold fleeces (see schedule). Any abandoned fleeces will become the property of MSBA.



- 17. The commission on sales will be 10% for MSBA members (current as of April 27, 2023) and 20% for non-members. If you wish to join MSBA (or update your membership), membership forms can be found via: www. sheepandwool.org or www.marylandsheepbreeders.org.
- 18. The role of the Festival is to act as a broker in order to make quality fleeces of all kinds available to spinners and other fiber artists and to provide a marketplace for wool producers.
- 19. MSBA will make every effort to display and care for the entered fleeces, but assumes no responsibility for damaged, lost, or stolen fleeces.

ATTENTION MARYLAND FLEECE PRODUCERS! \$100 MARYLAND SHEPHERDS CUP

The purpose of this award is to recognize consistent excellence in the production of handspinning fleeces by wool producers in Maryland. The winner will be judged to have entered the best set of five handspinning fleeces from an individual Maryland shepherd.

The Maryland Shepherds Cup is offered in remembrance of Mary Ann Jackson, shepherd at Spinning Flock Farm. Mary Ann was a long time supporter and active member of the Festival Committee and MSBA. As well as being named 2006 Maryland Shepherd of the Year with her husband Ed, Mary Ann initiated the fiber arts and shepherd workshops at the Festival, taught innumerable beginning spinners and weavers, and was a tireless supporter of textile arts.

The best entry of five fleeces will be the handspinners flock that has the highest quality fleeces for handspinning. This group can include diversity in fleece types or color or may be a grouping that demonstrates potential for a range of spinning techniques and outcomes. It could also be a historic flock; a homestead flock; or a perfectly matched group. (Above all this is the handspinners flock with outstanding fleeces).

The award will include a perpetual trophy inscribed with the name of each year's winner plus a \$100 prize.

Guidelines for entering:

1. Maryland shepherds will designate five handspinning fleeces from their own Maryland flock exhibit the best handspinning qualities. The fleeces must be from sheep belonging to the shepherd entering them and the farm must be in Maryland.

Premier Exhibitor: A plaque is awarded to the exhibitor in each show earning the highest number of points in placing.

Shepherds Award: This award is given to the consignor presenting his/her sheep in an attractive manner throughout the Festival. Helpful, courteous behavior and those that go above and beyond will also be considered.

Ernest Edward Hall Memorial Trophy: This award is given in memory of Ernie Hall, who unselfishly donated 16 years of dedicated service to the Festival. As a founder he worked tirelessly to establish the Festival and to help it grow into the major event that it is today. This trophy is awarded to the exhibitor of the Supreme Champion Ram.

Florence Byrnes Hall Memorial Trophy: This award is given in memory of the 16 years of dedicated service which Florence Hall gave to the Festival. She served as secretary and publicity coordinator for many years. Few were aware of the many hours behind the scene that Florence donated in the interest of helping the Festival to grow and develop into what it is today. This trophy is awarded to the exhibitor of the Supreme Champion Ewe.

The Lucy Conant Memorial Trophy: This trophy is presented in the memory of Lucy Conant, a devoted participant at the Festival for many years until her death in the summer of 1991. The "Friends of Lucy Conant" present this trophy to the exhibitor of the Champion Romney Ewe.

- 4. Entries mocking public figures and causing cultural division will be ineligible. Benign humor is, of course, what it's all about.







- An overall winner in each age group will be determined.
- The Best Maryland Entry will be awarded a prize of \$5.

Prize money and ribbons/rosettes may be picked up at the Sheep Promotion display in the Main Exhibition Annex during the hours the Festival is open. Any awards not picked up will be mailed (within the contiguous US) after the Festival.

Sheep Promotion Competition


Rules:

- 1. Contestants may create physical posters or electronic presentations. Physical posters may be designed in any medium.
- 2. All entries must be submitted in electronic format. Physical posters must be photographed or scanned to a .jpg file. Electronic presentations may be in the form of a PowerPoint presentation OR Google Slides presentation OR .jpg files (one per page) from another presentation software application.
- 3. For younger contestants, it's OK if a parent does the photographing/ scanning/cropping (when applicable) and submits the entry form. Parents must not make any changes to electronic presentations.
- 4. A presentation (whether done as physical posters or electronic slides) may consist of multiple pages/slides. The number of pages/slides is limited as follows: Mini one page/slide only, Junior up to two pages/slides, Intermediate—up to three pages/slides, and Senior up to four pages/slides.
- 5. All entries will be displayed on a computer screen, for both judging and possible subsequent display on the Festival website. The entries may also be projected at a larger size during the Festival. Therefore, keep to a rectangular landscape format and make sure that all lettering is large and clear enough to be read. An image that is at least 2,000 pixels wide will display best.
- 6. All entries must have been completed since the 2022 Festival.
- 7. Use of copyrighted characters prohibited.
- 8. Contestant's name <u>may not</u> appear in the presentation.

Sheep-to-Shawl Competition

Sunday 10:00 a.m. Main Exhibition Annex

Teams:

Due to space considerations, the number of competing teams will be limited to five. One back-up registration will be accepted, in case a team cannot compete as planned. Each team will consist of one shearer, three spinners, and one weaver. Please note: the shearer may not assist in the wool preparation or act as a helping member of the team during the competition. Youth teams (where all three spinners and the weaver are under 18 years of age as of January 1) are welcome to compete, and they will have different guidelines for their shawl.

Sheep:

Each team will provide its own sheep **with health papers**. See Animal Health Regulations on page 13. Any team needing help in finding a sheep should email Susan at ewesfulfiberarts@ gmail.com for referrals. Each team is responsible for arranging to have their sheep at the shearing area at the beginning of the competition, and led away immediately after shearing. The team is is also responsible for making arrangements to pay the sheep breeder for the fleece.

Warp:

Each team will provide its own warped loom. The sett should be no less than 8 epi (1600 to 2000 yds/lb.). Natural colored or hand dyed warp may be used, but no commercially dyed wool will be allowed. 5 bonus points will be added for a handspun warp.

Weft:

Hand carders, wool combs, and flickers are permitted; drum carders are not. In addition to manual spinning wheels, one battery-powered e-spinner will be allowed per team. The weft yarn may be no thicker than 2 times the diameter of the warp end.

Shawl Design:

Any weaving pattern may be used; however, the shawl must measure a minimum width of 22 inches as sleyed in the reed. The judges will check this width during the competition. The finished woven length must be 70" minimum, with a minimum 5" fringe on each end. The shawl lenght will be measured after removal from the loom. All ends must be finished by the end of the timed period. Removing knots to re-tie or alter the finish after measuring will not be allowed. Junior teams, with all members aged 17 and under, must have a shawl measuring at least 19 inches sleyed in the reed and at least 64 inches finished woven length, with at least 5 inch fringes.

Time:

Each team will be timed from the beginning of the shearing until the shawl is off the loom with fringes finished. There will be no pause in timing after the shearing. In addition, the spinners may not start their work until their shearer is completely finished. The shearing and completion of the shawl must take place within the 3-hour competition time period. A team that fails to have its shawl ready for measurement within that time will not participate in the prize money, although it may have the judges' evaluation of its work after the other shawls have been judged.

Auction:

Immediately after the judging there will be an auction of all shawls. Each team will receive the proceeds from the sale of the shawl less 10% contributed to the Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival. Shawls will be wet-finished by the teams, at home, after judging. The teams will then be responsible for mailing shawls to the buyers.

Sheep-to-Shawl Competition

This scoring point system will be used:

1. Team Identification (10 points)

- Team appearance, 5 points
- Team display, 5 points

2. Shearer (10 points)

- No second cuts, 5 points
- Appearance of sheep after shearing, 5 points

3. Spinners (30 points)

- Fleece selection color, cleanliness, and hand, 5 points
- Fleece preparation for spinning, 5 points
- Uniformity of spinning size and type of yarn produced, 10 points
- Ability to keep weaver supplied, 10 points

4. Weaver (30 points)

- Even selvedge, minimal draw-in, 5 points
- Even beating, 10 points
- No threading or treadling errors, 10 points
- Quality of fringe/hem stitching, 5 points

5. Finished Shawl (20 points)

- Detail and difficulty of design, 10 points
- Drapeability of shawl, 5 points
- Color compatibility of warp and weft, 5 points

6. Deductions for measurements outside standards:

- Length, 5 points
- Width, 5 points
- Fringe, 5 points

7. Bonus Points:

- Handspun warp, 5 points
- Plied weft yarn, 5 points

Rules

Please read and follow all requirements. Please note that various rules and/or categories have changed. Entries that do not follow all requirements may not be judged.

General Instructions

- 1. All entries must have been completed since the last in-person Festival in May 2022 and be clean and odor-free. Items must not be "in the grease."
- 2. An entry will only be accepted in one class. No more than two entries per class will be accepted from an individual.
- 3. All entries must be at least 50% wool except for classes S01-S05 and T80-T82 which must be 100% wool. "Wool" is defined as the product of shearing a sheep.
- 4. All entries must include:
 - A completed online or paper entry form
 - Online entry is **strongly encouraged** and can be accessed through www.sheepandwool.org/festival/skein-garment-competition/.
 - Online entry will close Friday, April 28, 2023 at 11:59 PM EST.
 - Multiple entries from an individual may be on one entry form.
 - The entry form must be correctly filled out including the specified indicator for any of the special prizes that the entry is eligible for.
 - A small return address label with the name and address of the entrant.
 Bring a label for each entry on the entry form. They will be placed on the entry tags and must adhere to the tags. Sticky notes are not acccepted.
 Please be sure this name matches the entrant on the entry form.
 - A card no larger than 3×5 for each entry, with:
 - The class number and name;
 - Age of entrant as of January 1, if 18 or under;
 - Fiber content, including breed if known;
 - To be eligible for special Maryland Sheep Breeders Association (MSBA) prizes, the wool must be from a flock on a farm located in Maryland. The name of the producer of the fiber, their farm's name (where applicable), and the city and state where the farm is located must be listed on the card. If this information is missing, the entry will not be eligible for the MSBA prizes.

- To be eligible for special Shave 'Em to Save 'Em prizes, a copy of your Shave 'Em to Save 'Em passport (showing the stamp from the participating breeder who produced the fiber used in your entry) must be attached to the entry's 3x5 card.
- o To be eligible for special Chesapeake Fibershed prizes, entries must use 100% fiber grown within the Chesapeake Fibershed, an area around Washington D.C and Baltimore Metro areas, including portions of the states of Maryland, Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia (see www.chesapeakefibershed. com for boundaries). If dyed, it must use materials grown and/ or foraged within the fibershed as well. The card must include the name of the fiber producer, name of the farm (if applicable), the name of the dyestuffs used and the city and state where the fiber and dye were obtained.
- For all handspun skeins, a description of techniques used and its intended use must be included.

Do not include your name on the 3x5 card.

- 5. Hangers and display equipment will not be accepted. If sculptural entry, all pieces must be securely attached.
- 6. Entries will be accepted in the Main Exhibition Annex at the Fairgrounds according to the following schedule:

Thursday, May 4, 2023 between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.	•	Receive entries accompanied by paper entry forms Receive entries where the entry form was completed online
Friday, May 5, 2023 between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m.	•	Receive entries where the entry form was completed online ONLY. NO paper entry forms accepted.

Late submissions will not be accepted. If you cannot meet the above deadlines, you should mail your entries.

7. Mailed entries should be sent to Maryland Skein & Garment Competition, 1001 Frederick Road, Number 9432, Catonsville, MD 21228. Mailed entries must be received no later than Tuesday, May 2, 2023. Inquiries can be made to skeinandgarment@sheepandwool.org. Mailed entries must be received with the required card (see 4, above) attached securely to each entry. Entries that do not have the required card attached may be excluded from judging at the Skein & Garment Committee's discretion. The Skein & Garment Committee assumes no responsibility for cards that become detached or lost during mailing.

- 8. Judging will take place Friday, May 5th. The judges have the right to shift entries to more appropriate classes. Judges' decisions are final. All entries will be displayed uncovered but supervised during Festival hours. The Festival will make every effort to display and care for the entered pieces, but assumes no responsibility for damage or loss.
- 9. The show will close at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 7. Entries will not be released under any circumstances before 4:30 p.m., and must be claimed by 5:30 p.m. that evening. Entries will not be returned by mail. Entries not picked up will become the property of the Maryland Sheep Breeders Association, Inc.
- 10. Submission of an entry constitutes permission that the entry may be shown and/or described by the Festival or sponsors on webpages and/or social media.

General Instructions for Handspun Skeins

- 1. Each handspun skein entry must be prepared and spun by the entrant alone except for class G01. (Entries not made entirely from fiber processed/prepared and spun by the entrant must be entered as using commercially prepared fiber.)
- 2. "Fine" yarn is 20 or more wraps per inch and each skein of fine yarn must weigh at least 1 ounce.
- 3. "Medium" yarn is 10 to 19 wraps per inch and each skein must weigh at least 2 ounces.
- 4. "Thick" yarn is less than 10 wraps per inch and each skein must weigh at least 2 ounces.
- Each skein must be:
 - 1.5 to 2 yards in circumference.
 - Wound neatly with the 2 ends of the skein tied together.
 - Appropriately secured with at least 2 ties.
- 6. Commercially prepared fiber may only be used in classes S06, S07, S11, S12, S13, and S15.
- 7. Remember to include technique description and intended use.

General Instructions for Entries Made with Handspun (for classes other than S01-S15)

- 1. Entries not made entirely from yarn spun by the entrant must be entered as using commercial yarn.
- 2. Handspun yarn spun by the entrant can be from commercially processed fiber or fiber processed by the entrant.

General Instructions for Hand Knitting

- 1. Articles knit partially or entirely on a knitting machine or knitting loom are not eligible for entry in classes K01-K16.
- 2. Entries that include both commercial and hand-spun yarn must be entered in the otherwise appropriate commercial class.

General Instructions for Felting

Felted articles (hand-knitted and then felted, handwoven and then felted, felted from fleece, or needle-felted) should be entered in classes F01-F04. Knitted or woven articles that have been fulled, i.e., stitches or warp and weft yarn are readily visible, must be entered in the class of the primary technique.

Classes

Skeins - 100% wool processed by spinner from raw wool

- S01 Fine singles yarn
- **S02** Medium to thick singles yarn
- **S03** Fine plied yarn
- S04 Medium plied yarn
- S05 Thick plied yarn

Skeins – at least 50% Wool

- **S06** Singles yarn spun from commercially prepared fibers
- **S07** Plied yarn spun from commercially prepared fibers
- S08 Singles or plied yarn processed and blended by spinner
- **S09** Singles or plied yarn processed and natural dyed by spinner
- S10 Singles or plied yarn processed and chemically dyed by spinner
- **S11** Expressive (novelty) yarn. To qualify, the yarn must be spun using a defined technique and be well constructed (examples are bouclé, corespun, tufted, etc.). Fiber can be processed by spinner or commercially prepared.
- S12 Handspinners dyed yarn basket a minimum of one pound of yarn spun in any manner for use in one project displayed in a basket. Include a description of the fiber techniques used to spin the yarn and its intended use. A pattern, sketch or sample swatch of the project must be displayed. This class will be judged on craftsmanship and creativity. Fiber can be processed by spinner or commercially prepared.
- S13 Handspinners natural colored yarn basket same as Class S12
- **S14** Novice spinner (spinning one year or less) using fiber processed by spinner singles or plied yarn
- **S15** Novice spinner (spinning one year or less) using commercially prepared fiber singles or plied yarn



Youth Conservationist Program

The Youth Conservationist Program is open to all youth between the ages of 9 and 18. Recipients agree to the following conditions:

- They must exhibit their ewe a minimum of two times in the receiving year, preferably one of which being their state fair;
- They must breed their ewe to a registered ram of the same breed in the fall of the receiving year;
- They must utilize the ewe's fleece, either by processing it themselves or by selling it to another crafter;
- They must prepare a report with pictures for the donor, to be displayed the following year at the Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival;
- They must promote the YCP and their breed at least once, whether through an article in their local paper or through a breed association newsletter;
- They must be present at the Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival on Sunday, May 7, 2023 to receive their ewe.

Applications from interested youth, along with a one-page letter of recommendation, must be submitted by April 1, 2023. Applications must be filled out completely and signed by both the youth and their parent/guardian. 
